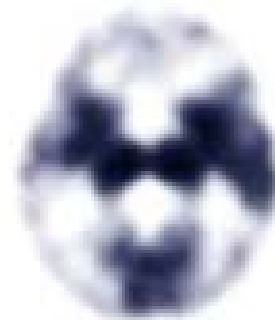
Brain Growth

2 Months

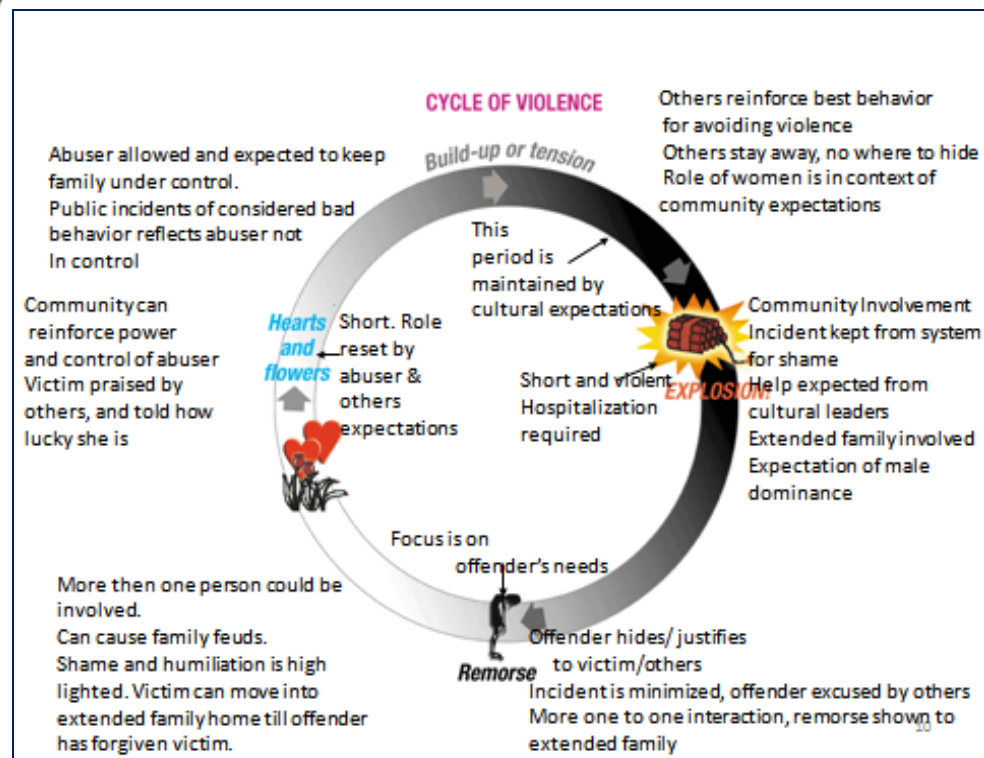

Holistic Approach - Viewing the Whole Family Unit as One

1. Engage
2. Address safety issues for victims and children
3. Form relationship to talanoa – discuss critical issue of violence, beliefs
4. Assessment phase
5. Match up programs/intervention to individual or whole family/parents
6. Collaborate on an agreed family/individual plan. Accountability built in – use extended family, written agreement etc.
7. Run the agreed program with input from the participants. Tailor to their needs and perspectives
8. Monitor ,evaluate and review for effectiveness – did it work?
9. Is the family environment better, safer, children happier, no incidents?
10. Address tasks for contributors to violence e.g. health, truancy, financial, budgeting, stress and anger.
11. Connect the family with the relevant service e.g WINZ. Housing
12. Individuals requiring specialist help and assistance – refer on
