This postgraduate programme is a collaboration between the School of Population Health and the School of Counselling, Human Services and Social Work at the University of Auckland.

Who is the pathway designed for? Practitioners (e.g., trainers, prevention and support workers, counsellors, social workers, health professionals), health promoters, researchers, and policy analysts and managers. It is suitable for people already working in the field, or people considering doing so.

What does it offer? The pathway provides an opportunity to take a variety of courses aimed at increasing knowledge and understanding of the important fields of intimate partner violence, child abuse and neglect and other forms of family and whanau violence. The two core courses are each taught by leading academics in the field, and have been designed to cover the core competencies required of professionals working in this sector. Assessments are designed to help you think through and develop solutions to real-world problems.

When and How? The delivery format for the two core courses is via three 2-day blocks in Auckland, so they can be combined with work or distance learning.

What qualification can I get? Courses can be taken as stand-alone courses, or as part of a postgraduate Health Sciences or Social Work qualification, and at the Postgraduate Certificate, Diploma or Masters degree level.
